A new race this year, the A.F.P Fane Trophy for chaindriven Frazer Nashes, is not to be missed. "These cars will be sideways everywhere, regardless of the weather," says Head of Event Content Matt Hearn, "there are at least seven drivers who could win, they are so competitive, and it will be brilliant.

"The Varzi Trophy grid includes a very special car, the Bugatti T51 in which Achille Varzi himself won the Monaco Grand Prix from pole in 1933. The Surtees Trophy is back this year, that's for the big Group 7 sports cars with a great selection of Ford GT40s, Lolas,

From Porsche sports cars to chain-driven Frazer Nashes, from ferret racing to V10 Formula 1 cars – the Members' Meeting is back with a roar.

McLarens, the two Chevy-powered Chinooks and the McKee with its stars and stripes livery. The popular Graham Hill Trophy is also back, in the 60th anniversary year of the Brit's first Formula 1 world championship, and the AC Cobras will no doubt be up at the front."

As for the drivers coming to entertain us, look out for the House Captains – Anthony Reid, Emanuele Pirro, Jochen Mass and Nicolas Minassian –as well as Eric Comas, Esteban Gutiérrez, Henri Pescarolo, Jean-Éric Vergne, Jason Plato and Tom Kristensen.

The GRRC grid walks will be a must this year as members will be on the grid for both the Porsche 956/962 and the V10 Formula 1 demonstrations. Along with many others in the 956/962 demonstration, there will be three cars coming from the Porsche Museum, all of them running in the dusk with headlights ablaze. Drivers include Hans-Joachim Stuck,

Derek Bell and, hopefully, multiple Le Mans winner Klaus Ludwig. We can expect up to 25 cars from the V10 era of grand prix racing, a period that many consider to have been the peak of performance and spectacle in the sport.

Away from the racing itself, there will be fierce competition for the coveted House Shield in a programme of sports including ferret racing, duck herding, tug-of-war and tests of skill on the skid pan.

TICKETS AND GRANDSTANDS

Both tickets and grandstands for the 79th Members' Meeting are due to sell out imminently. Please head to goodwood.com immediately if you would like to purchase either. While the Members' Meeting is a more intimate affair, the best views are found from the grandstands around the site.



Houses Methuen, Aubigny, Torbolton and Darnley will once again be competing to win the House Shield. Don't forget that you can also score points for your house by taking part in a range of activities from tug-of-war to ferret racing, via duck herding and stunt driving on the Low Grip Arena. New for this year is a Land Rover experience, which will use Goodwood's classic Land Rovers. Elsewhere, The Health Club will be heading up a school sports day, which will include sack races, threelegged races, table tennis and badminton. The Education Trust is also going to host a family area where the team will run nature-based activities for children. This will be located on the Super Shell Lawn where there will be leaf printing and décor, and hazel paintbrush making.

There is a huge array of live music, including a soul act and drumming band Batala, as well as street performers and food, all followed by a spectacular fireworks display. There will also be some fantastic music in The Daffodil, Members' Market and Great Hall.



DEMONSTRATIONS

Both the Porsche 956/962s and the V10 Formula 1 cars will head out onto the circuit twice on each day. The demonstrations are the highlight of the weekend for many, so don't miss the chance to see these amazing cars.

CARS TO LOOK **OUT FOR AT THE** 79TH MEMBERS' MEETING

As well as some Goodwood regulars, there are always 'new' cars to look out for. Here are some of our favourites.



The V10 Formula 1 cars are still being confirmed, however, make sure you get a good look at the 2000McLaren-Mercedes MP4/15.

While it was narrowly beaten to the titles that year by the Ferrari F1-2000, it scored seven victories in the hands of David Coulthard and Mika Häkkinen. The design of the car was overseen by Adrian Newey and Mario Illien built the bespoke 3-litre V10 Mercedes-supplied Ilmor engine. Chassis number 5, that will be at the Members' Meeting, was driven by the Finn.

Also on track will be a 1992 Brabham-Judd BT60B that Damon Hill drove when he first arrived in Formula 1. The future Formula 1 world champion wasn't a huge fan of the car. Unsurprising, when its best result of the year was at the Hungarian Grand Prix where it was the final finisher in 11th, four laps down on the winner Ayrton Senna. It would be Brabham's last race in Formula 1.



These two cars, coming from the Porsche Museum, are perhaps two of the most important sports cars from the era. The former won Le Mans in 1982, driven by Jacky Ickx and Derek Bell. That year, the German manufacturer filled the top five spots at the finish,

The 962C is the 1987 Le Mans 24 Hours winner, driven by Bell, Hans Stuck and Al Holbert. That year marked the seventh consecutive Le Mans victory for Porsche. The German marque's dominance was finally broken in 1988 when Jaguar triumphed with its XJR-9LM.

Bell and Ickx formed a great partnership driving the Porsches and Bell later commented: "The reason I liked driving with Jacky was that he was always lucky!"

1960 FERRARI 250 **DROGO** #1717GT

This particular car left the factory as a Pinninfarina Coupe but, following a crash in the early 1960s, the chassis was shortened by Vaccari and rebodied by Piero Drogo's Carrozzeria Sportscars. At the same time, it was upgraded to the full 250 GTO specification: six carburettors,

a five-speed gearbox and Watts link rear suspension. Displayed at the 1985 Geneva Motor Show, it was also

> raced in the Mont Ventoux Historic Hillclimb that year as well. In 2000 it was given a comprehensive restoration by DK Engineering and following that it was raced at the 2001 Goodwood Revival by David Clark and Stefan Johansson.


PROTECTING THE SHIELD

Members' Meeting Methuen House Captain Anthony Reid, multiple winner of the House Shield, will be defending his title as keenly as ever having won again last year.

This year I'm racing a very rare GT car, a 1964 Cheetah, in the Graham Hill Trophy. It's based on a Chevrolet Corvette - front-engined, rear-wheel drive with drum brakes, which I'm not so happy about it as they tend to fade! The engine is in the middle of the car, so I'll be sitting far back, above the back axle. It's not a winning car, but a top-ten finish would be great. I hope to be out in the Gerry Marshall Trophy too so I'll be busy.

We have won the House Shield five times in the last seven years, so I'll be trying to encourage everyone to get involved in the sports. I do them all - the tug of war, duck herding, ferret racing, axe throwing. You name it, I'm there, swapping my racing boots for outdoor boots and trying to win points. My racing overalls are modelled on my House Captain's blazer, so I don't need to keep changing between racing and duck herding... I love the flavour of the event, it's exclusive, unique, intimate, and so quintessentially British, and you get to meet so many interesting people when we all gather for the evening festivities on Saturday night.

















BUEN VIAJE

The España Driving Tour in May will journey through an area that will forever be linked with motorsport.

On May 22-31 this year, the GRRC is returning to the north of Spain for a special driving tour. Taking in some of the best roads and hotels in the area, it promises to be a very memorable few days.

On the route is Oviedo, the capital of the Asturias Principality and home to over 200,000 people. The town's future was changed forever on 29 July, 1981 when a couple called José and Ana gave birth to a baby boy. José was a mine shaft explosives mechanic, and amateur kart driver, while Ana worked in the local department store.

Educated in the area, the boy grew up with a talent for football – his father would turn down an offer for him to play for the RC Celta de Vigo football club. With weekends away at the circuit, José was keen for their eldest, a daughter called Lorena, to try the sport. She showed little interest

and the three-year-old boy received a kart (right) instead.

At that age he couldn't reach the pedals, so extensions were fitted and, come the age of five, he had his racing licence. Money was tight and even rain tyres were a stretch, which meant that the young boy had to race with slicks in the wet.

However, even at that age, he showed a remarkable competitive instinct, coming up with three timing sectors for his route to school so that he could time himself daily.

Kart championships soon followed and in 1999 he progressed to the Euro Open by Nissan Championship. Emerging as champion, he raced in the 2000 Formula 3000

Championship and, come
4 March, 2001, he was on
the Formula 1 grid in a
Minardi PS01 at the
Australian Grand Prix. Four
years later, Fernando Alonso
would win the first of two
world championships for

Renault and this year he starts his 20th Formula 1 season.

Not far from Oviedo is Fernando Alonso's kart track and museum – well worth a visit if you are on the España Driving Tour in May this year. If you'd like to book a place, please contact the club.




FACTORY VISITS WITH MCLAREN

FESTIVAL OF SPEED TICKETS

The 2022 Festival of Speed presented by Mastercard qualifies for the UK Government's 'creative industry tax relief', with a reduced VAT rate of 12.5% per cent until 31 March, 2022. Tickets, which are now limited for the Festival, will remain at the reduced VAT rate until the end of March, when it will return to the full rate of 20 per cent.

On top of the VAT ticket saving, your GRRC discount on general admission tickets and grandstand passes will be automatically applied once you have logged into your GRRC online account.
